

Frank W. Putnam, MD

Dr. Frank W. Putnam is Professor of Pediatrics and Psychiatry, Cincinnati Children's Hospital Medical Center, University of Cincinnati College of Medicine and Professor of Psychiatry, University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill. From 1999 until July 2011, he was Director of the Mayerson Center for Safe and Healthy Children, which evaluates over 1500 children annually for allegations of child abuse and neglect. He is Director of the Trauma Treatment Training Center (TTTC), which trains about 100 therapists annually in evidence-based treatments for traumatized children. The TTTC also adapts and tests standard treatments for unique settings and populations such as the Juvenile Justice and military families. He received his BA from Wesleyan University in Connecticut and his MA and MD from Indiana University School of Medicine. He completed a residency in adult psychiatry at Yale University and a fellowship in child and adolescent psychiatry at Children's Hospital National Medical Center (George Washington University) in Washington, DC. He is board certified in adult, adolescent, and child psychiatry. As Chief of Developmental Traumatology at the National Institute of Mental Health (1985-1999), he directed a research program on the effects of child abuse on the neurobiological, psychological, and social development of children. Dr. Putnam's current research is focused on the implementation of large-scale interventions for prevention and treatment of child abuse and neglect and maternal depression. He is the author of over 175 scientific articles and chapters and 2 books on the effects of stress and trauma.
